What a treat you missed. A superb illustrated presentation on the life of swifts, by Simon Hooton, on why they are under threat and how we can help them recover. We have a Swift advice centre on our website with sources of boxes and callers. We are waiting clearance for the establishment of a tower block of nest boxes in St Mary's, Ixworth, church tower.

Wild Isles

The BBC series showed the breadth and depth of nature in the British Isles. And was a treat. The final episode was Saving the Wild Isles, only available on iPlayer. We presume some of the content was seen as too critical of government. It was funded by RSPB, WWF and the National Trust with narration by David Attenborough.

What can we do with our grey water.

Not put it into the sewers and waste it, adding to storm overflows. Good news from San Francisco where new laws insist that greywater from flats, houses, offices, etc be cleaned and whilst cannot be drunk, can be used, with inhouse treatment, for washing machines and flushing toilets. These are the biggest household users of drinking water. A newly developed machine takes out pollutants, soap, detergent, etc. making use of greywater from showers, laundry and bathroom sinks in a 40-story San Francisco apartment building. The company, Epic, is running the first approved greywater recycling system in San Francisco, where buildings erected after 1 January 2022 are required to install onsite water reuse systems.

Epic said "We're going into these buildings, which globally use 14% of all water, and almost none of them reuse that water. And we are helping these recycling projects reuse up to 95% of their water," CEO Tartakovsky said.

In Britain we have "encouragement" for developers to make use of grey water.

Sharpe practice in Planning Changes

Having failed to push through Parliament its changes to the planning system, government is now seeking to do the same by stealth. More than eight out of 10 councillors fear local democracy will be eroded unless MPs and peers heed their warnings and amend the government's Levelling Up and Regeneration Bill, which is close to completing its passage through Parliament. The proposals seek to give the Secretary of State, power to make rules, without going before Parliament, which can bind local planning authorities to follow government wishes.
